## 7th Court of Appeals Update

I've harped about preserving error for review many times. Here is a twist. Sometimes issues are intertwined and build on each other. So, failing to raise one deprives you of the foundation for the other. For instance, in Taylor v. Lubbock Reg'l MHMR, No. 07-13-00381-CV, 2015 Tex. App. LEXIS 10392 (Tex. App.—Amarillo October 7, 2015), the appellant argued that the trial court erred in entering a summary judgment against him and referred to evidence he proffered in response to the summary judgment motion. But, the trial court granted his opponent's motion to strike that

evidence. More importantly, appellant failed to question, on appeal, the decision to strike his evidence. Because of that omission, we could not consider the evidence in determining whether summary judgment was appropriate.

Just a reminder that an order saying something like "the motion for summary judgment is granted" is not a final, appealable decree. Why, you ask . . . well because it does not adjudicate the rights of the parties. This has been mentioned before. But it keeps coming up, like in Mendoza v. Louisiana Stone LLC., No. 07-15-00133-CV, 2015 Tex. App. LEXIS 10789 (Tex. App.—Amarillo, October 20, 2015). The order needs to tell the parties what they are getting or not getting or who wins or loses. In other words, it has to express a specific settlement of the rights between the parties.

Here's another bit about Anders' briefing. You already know that the appellant is entitled to write a response when his attorney submits an Anders brief. Implicit in that entitlement is the right to review the record. Many attorneys send the record to their client as a matter of course. Many do not. Think about doing the former to avoid delay, especially when an Anders brief was filed in a civil proceeding where parental rights were terminated. Termination appeals are accelerated, which means that we have a mandated time deadline to satisfy. This was discussed recently in In re L.V., No. 07-15-00315-CV (Tex. App.—Amarillo November 9, 2015) (order).


After surviving the bar, Jeremi Young was kind enough to give Leslie a job for a couple months


